RECENT ACTIVITIES OF THE INITIATIVE

THE THIRD OF A 2020 SERIOUS OF RGEI WEBINARS: ELECTRICITY TRADE IN THE GCC AND MIDDLE EAST POTENTIAL OF A PAN-ARAB ELECTRICITY MARKET

On 22 April 2020, RGEI Initiative hosted the third of a serious of RGEI 2020 Webinars: Electricity Trade in the GCC and Middle East Potential of a Pan-Arab Electricity Market. The speaker was Mr. Phillip Cornell, the consultant from World Bank Group/Atlantic Council. Mr. Phillip Cornell is the consultant of World Bank Group and senior fellow of Atlantic Council. He is the lead author of World Bank Group study on political economy of MENA power and gas interconnection, trade, and cross-border infrastructure to support the Pan Arab Regional Energy Trade Platform (PA-RETP). He is also the director of the Global Energy Governance Reform Task Force, including project conception and leadership, the specialist on Middle East and global energy economics, oil market, and Saudi Arabinan transformation. He once worked as the senior corporate planning advisor of Saudi Aramco, special advisor to the executive director in IEA, etc., has a major expertise in international grid integration study on power infrastructure and trade in MENA, South Asia, South East Asia.

More than 80 representatives from CEM Secretariat, RGEI member countries, international organizations, enterprises, research institute, etc. participated in this webinar. Particularly the big delegation from Saudi Arabia Company (SEC) attended this webinar and warmly discussed with the speaker on the power interconnection issues. The webinar has obtained widespread positive feedback on both the content and pattern.

THE FOURTH OF A 2020 SERIOUS OF RGEI WEBINARS: POWER GRID CONNECTION AND ITS TECHNICAL ISSUES

On 26 May 2020, RGEI Initiative hosted the fourth of a serious of RGEI 2020 Webinars: Power Grid Connection and its Technical Issues. The speaker was Prof. Ryuichi Yokoyama, professor from Waseda University. Ryuichi Yokoyama is a Professor Emeritus of Waseda University, a Life Fellow of IEEE, a Senior Life Member of IEE of Japan, a member of CIGRE. He is also Chairman of Standardization Commissions of Electric Apparatus in METI Japan. He received the degrees of B.S., M.S., and Ph.D. in electrical engineering from Waseda University, Tokyo, Japan, in 1968, 1970, and 1974 respectively. After working in Mitsubishi Research Institute, from 1978 through 2007, he was a professor in the Faculty of Technology of Tokyo Metropolitan University. Since 2007, he had been a professor of the Graduate School of Environment and Energy Engineering in Waseda University. His fields of interests include planning, operation, control and optimization of large-scale environment and energy systems, and economic analysis and risk management of deregulated power markets.

Dr. Yongping Zhai, Chief of Energy Sector Group, Asian Development Bank(ADB), in charge of overall energy operations coordination, and knowledge partnership in Asia and the Pacific region. Prior to his current position, Dr Yongping Zhai was Director, South Asia Energy Division (2010-2015), ADB, covering energy sector operations in Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal and Sri Lanka. He served as ADB's Principal Energy Specialist (2000-2010) in charge of energy sector in Southeast Asia including Indonesia, Philippines, Vietnam and the Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS). Prior to joining ADB in 2000, Dr. Zhai worked for African Development Bank from 1993 to 2000. Dr. Yongping Zhai graduated from the Thermal Energy Engineering Department, Tsinghua University, Beijing, China (1983) and received a Ph.D in Energy Economics from Institute of Energy Economics and Policy in Grenoble, France (1989), and worked as Assistant Professor on Energy Planning and Policy at Asian Institute of Technology based in Bangkok (1990-1993).
